HOW TO HONOR YOUR SPIRITUAL LEADERS 1 Timothy 5:17-25

God's Word teaches principles for every relationship.

These verses help us discover four ways we can honor our spiritual leaders.

> HONOR THEM FINANCIALLY – 1 Timothy 5:17-18

The elders who rule well are to be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who work hard at preaching and teaching. ¹⁸For the Scripture says, "YOU SHALL NOT MUZZLE THE OX WHILE HE IS THRESHING," and "The laborer is worthy of his wages." 1 Timothy 5:17-18 (New American Standard Bible)

- Two things are important in leadership: Skills and Character
- Three kinds of elders:
 - 1. <u>Volunteer</u> or "lay" elders
 - 2. Paid Staff those who "direct the affairs of the church"
 - 3. Preacher and Teacher
- Double honor = an attitude of honor and financial support
- "honorarium" = financial support as an act of honor

Who at any time serves as a soldier at his own expense? Who plants a vineyard and does not eat the fruit of it? Or who tends a flock and does not use the milk of the flock?... ¹³Do you not know that those who perform sacred services eat the food of the temple, and those who attend regularly to the altar have their share from the altar? ¹⁴So also the Lord directed those who proclaim the gospel to get their living from the gospel. 1 Corinthians 9:7; 13-14 (NASB)

Principle: When your leaders do well, pay them well.

> HONOR THEM WITH FAIR TREATMENT – 1 Timothy 5:19-21

Do not receive an accusation against an elder except on the basis of two or three witnesses. ²⁰Those who continue in sin, rebuke in the presence of all, so that the rest also will be fearful of sinning. ²¹I solemnly charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus and of His chosen angels, to maintain these principles without bias, doing nothing in the spirit of partiality. 1 Timothy 5:19-21 (NASB)

- See 1 Timothy Chapter 3 for qualifications of leaders.
- These verses help show us three things:
 - 1. How to guard against <u>false accusations</u>
 - 2. A process to follow when leaders disqualify themselves
 - 3. There is to be no partiality or favoritism within the church.

Principle: When your leaders are criticized, treat them fairly.

If your brother sins, go and show him his fault in private; if he listens to you, you have won your brother. ¹⁶But if he does not listen to you, take one or two more with you, so that BY THE MOUTH OF TWO OR THREE WITNESSES EVERY FACT MAY BE CONFIRMED." Matthew 18:15-16 (NASB)

> HONOR THEM WITH OUR EXPECTATIONS – 1 Timothy 5:22, 24-25

Do not lay hands upon anyone too hastily and thereby share responsibility for the sins of others; keep your self free from sin. ²⁴The sins of some men are quite evident, going before them to judgment; for others, their sins follow after. ²⁵Likewise also, deeds that are good are quite evident, and those which are otherwise cannot be concealed. 1 Timothy 5:22, 24-25 (NASB)

- When appointing new elders, or restoring leaders be sure to:
 - 1. Don't be hasty.
 - 2. Give the process <u>time</u>.
- Integrity does not equal perfection.

Principle: When you choose a leader, <u>expect integrity</u>.

HONOR THEM WITH ENCOURAGEMENT TO <u>HEALTHY LIVING</u> – 1 Timothy 5:23

No longer drink water exclusively, but use a little wine for the sake of your stomach and your frequent ailments. 1 Timothy 5:23 (NASB)

Principle: Leaders are to be encouraged to strike a balance of <u>purity</u> and <u>healthy living</u>.

Whatever you do, do your work heartily, as for the Lord rather than for men. Colossians 3:23 (NASB)
