Let Freedom Reign

Galatians 5:1-12

It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery. ²Mark my words! I, Paul, tell you that if you let ourselves be circumcised, Christ will be of no value to you at all. ³Again I declare to every man who lets himself be circumcised that he is obligated to obey the whole law. ⁴You who are trying to be justified by law have been alienated from Christ; you have fallen away from grace. ⁵But by faith we eagerly await through the Spirit the righteousness for which we hope. ⁶For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision has any value. The only thing that counts is faith expressing itself through love. ⁷You were running a good race. Who cut in on you and kept you from obeying the truth? ⁸That kind of persuasion does not come from the one who calls you. ⁹"A little yeast works through the whole batch of dough."¹⁰I am confident in the Lord that you will take no other view. The one who is throwing you into confusion will pay the penalty, whoever he may be.¹¹Brothers, if I am still preaching circumcision, why am I still being persecuted? In that case the offense of the cross has been abolished. ¹²As for those agitators, I wish they would go the whole way and emasculate themselves! Galatians 5:1-12 (New International Version)

Today's passage helps us identify three guidelines for a freedom-filled life.

• Guideline #1: We must <u>stand firm</u> in the freedom of Christ. (Galatians 5:1)

I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me. Galatians 2:20 (NIV)

Three observations from the verse:

#1: Our <u>calling</u> is to have freedom in Christ.

#2: Our <u>commitment</u> is to stand firm in the truth of the Gospel.

To "stand firm" in the Greek can mean to persevere and persist.

. . . let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. ^{2}Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith. . . . Hebrews 12:1-2 (NIV)

#3: Our <u>caution</u> is to stay away from legalistic bondage.

We must pay more careful attention, therefore, to what we have heard, so that we do not drift away. Hebrews 2:1 (NIV)

Formerly, when you did not know God, you were slaves to those who by nature are not gods. Galatians 4:8 (NIV)

• Guideline #2: Freedom must not be lost through <u>legalism</u>. (Galatians 5:2-6)

In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you." Luke 22:20 (NIV)

All who rely on observing the law are under a curse, for it is written: "Cursed is everyone who does not continue to do everything written in the Book of the Law." Galatians 3:10 (NIV)

For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking all of it. James 2:10 (NIV)

Steve McVey, in his book *Grace Walk*, defines legalism as "a system in which a person seeks to gain God's acceptance or blessing by what he or she does."

The power of sin is the law. See 1 Corinthians 15:56 (NIV).

• Guideline #3: We must not allow <u>false teaching</u> to steal our freedom. (Galatians 5:7-12)
