Best to Be Blessed

Luke 6:17-26

Jesus' sermon reveals what it truly means to be a blessed believer.

He went down with them and stood on a level place. A large crowd of his disciples was there and a great number of people from all over Judea, from Jerusalem, and from the coast of Tyre and Sidon, ¹⁸ who had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases. Those troubled by evil spirits were cured, ¹⁹ and the people all tried to touch him, because power was coming from him and healing them all. ²⁰Looking at his disciples, he said: "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. ²¹ Blessed are you who hunger now, for you will be satisfied. Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh. ²² Blessed are you when men hate you, when they exclude you and insult you and reject your name as evil, because of the Son of Man. ²³ Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, because great is your reward in heaven. For that is how their fathers treated the prophets. ²⁴ But woe to you who are rich, for you have already received your comfort. ²⁵ Woe to you who are well fed now, for you will go hungry. Woe to you who laugh now, for you will mourn and weep. ²⁶ Woe to you when all men speak well of you, for that is how their fathers treated the false prophets." Luke 6:17-26 (New International Version)

Principle #1: BLESSED BELIEVERS ARE POOR AND HUNGRY.

Looking at his disciples, he said, "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. ²¹Blessed are you who hunger now, for you will be satisfied . . . ²⁴But woe to you who are rich, for you have already received your comfort. ²⁵Woe to you who are well fed now, for you will go hungry." Luke 6:20-21, 24-25a (NIV)

- "Blessed" from the Greek, "mekarios" = overwhelming joy or happiness; denotes the quality of <u>deity</u>
- There can be no blessing without <u>Christ's indwelling</u>.
- "Poverty" from the Greek = someone who has to beg for what they get
- A good appetite is a sign of <u>health</u>.
- "Woe" from the Greek, "ouai" = a situation of horror, disaster, and calamity
- Are you still hungering and thirsting for God's Word?

Taste and see that the LORD is good; blessed is the man who takes refuge in him. Psalm 34:8 (NIV)

Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things. Philippians 4:8 (NIV)

Anyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness. Hebrews 5:13 (NIV)

Application:	

> Principle #2. BLESSED BELIEVERS ARE **HURTING** AND **HATED**.

"Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh. ²²Blessed are you when men hate you, when they exclude you and insult you and reject your name as evil, because of the Son of Man. ²³Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, because great is your reward in heaven. For that is how their fathers treated the prophets. ²⁵... Woe to you who laugh now, for you will mourn and weep. ²⁶Woe to you when all men speak well of you, for that is how their fathers treated the false prophets." Luke 6:21b-23, 25b-26 (NIV)

- The difference between anger and anguish is a <u>broken heart</u>.
- o Being hated by the world is an <u>identification marker</u> of being a Christ-follower. "If the world hates you, keep in mind that it hated me first. ¹⁹ If you belonged to the world, it would love you as its own. As it is, you do not belong to the world, but I have chosen you out of the world. That is why the world hates you." John 15:18-19 (NIV)
- When we take a stand for Christ, we will experience troubles.
 "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16:33 (NIV)

Application: Am I a friend of the world or am I facing persecution for Christ's sake?

> Principle #3. BLESSED BELIEVERS ARE HOPEFUL PEOPLE!

"Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, because great is your reward in heaven." Luke 6:23a (NIV)

 Blessed people look beyond the here and now and, instead, look to their eternal home.

Application:

- Do I have a humble spirit that displays a beggar's dependence on God?
- Do I crave spiritual growth?
- Do I love to study God's Word?
- Does my sin and the sin of others cause a mourning in my spirit?
- Does my heart ache for the things that break God's heart?
- Do I live my life in a way that takes a stand for Christ and God's truth?
- Do I rejoice in the <u>hope and rewards</u> that Jesus promises?
